Law and Public Policy is a cornerstone graduate course delivering a comprehensive introduction to major topics, theories and issues relevant to the legal and ethical elements of the 21st century business environment. This course is designed as a survey course to cover a broad scope of basic concepts, along with their application to three major policy areas. The course contains an exploration of the role of public policy in the business environment. The also examines the legal environment of business, including key elements of private law (contracts, torts, and business organization law) and public law (employment law, administrative law, securities regulations, environmental law, and intellectual property law).

PURPOSES AND GOALS OF MBA 4610

This course also focuses on legal and ethical reasoning and strives to enhance each student's ability to integrate these perspectives into appropriate business decisions. Beyond these overarching goals, the Law and Public Policy will encourage students to:

- To provide a background and foundation in the fundamental concepts of law and public policy to apply throughout the MBA program.
- To introduce students to concepts of law and public policy essential to the Compass courses created in the MBA program.
- To elevate the ability of students to analyze important legal questions and problems facing business.
- > To elevate the ability of students to analyze trends and forces in public policy that affect business.

The course will include elements of lecture, interactive student to student and student to professor discussion as well as several student debates. Class sessions will emphasize topic introductions, theoretical foundations as well as case and current issue analysis. Besides taking one comprehensive examination, students will also be required to take a series of quizzes, engage in two written and verbal issue debates and actively participate in class discussions. Students have one class period to contest or verify any grade from the date upon which such grade is posted. No exceptions will be made. Throughout the quarter, a series of speakers may be invited to discuss legal and ethical issues arising in their professional environments. Students are encouraged to engage these speakers both during and after each presentation.

INSTRUCTIONAL PHILOSOPHY AND PEDAGOGY

If interest exists, review sessions may be held prior to all quizzes and examinations. Professor Ciocchetti will determine specific dates for these reviews and each review session is voluntary. It is also beneficial to discuss what I consider to be high quality examination answers and, accordingly, we may dedicate time for a brief answer-review period subsequent to each quiz and examination. Finally, I reserve the right to revise this syllabus and grade schematic, if necessary, in order to accomplish more effectively the learning objectives of the course. In other words, if I've made a mistake, I get to fix it.
